ASIST

Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training

Join David, Maureen and Khom for our parent workshop next week as we share insights from our recent two-day ASIST workshop on suicide intervention. Recent data from the World Health Organization (WHO, 2021) indicates that suicide remains a leading cause of death among young people worldwide, with approximately 700,000 lives lost each year. This session aims to relay what we learnt about the skills to recognise early warning signs and offer meaningful support in the moment, keeping people 'Safe for now'.

Nexus is a compassionate, caring community dedicated to protecting every individual and we hope what you can learn can spur you to find out more so that together, we can create an environment where every life is valued and intervention becomes second nature.




BOOK WEEK 2025

Is Langton Matravers a Dickens Character or a village in England? What about Ham Peggotty? Ask a learner

This year's book week kicked off every morning with the now-traditional book week quiz in secondary tutor time. As well as the Dickens/Village questions above the students also had to identify famous book titles based on codes and pictures, to answer general literary knowledge questions and, a new round, to identify famous books from pictures made by Al based on their titles and a famous artist. This one was particularly enjoyable.









Beyond that, we have been engaging with the theme of "Reading in the Wild" by asking the learners to choose their favourite quote about nature from novels, poems, plays, songs, films or really anywhere that they've found some wisdom or inspiration about the natural world. They've produced some wonderful answers which are being displayed as part of a developing display on the fourth floor. This is what it looks like now, but it will keep expanding as more learners add their thoughts. We hope parents will come and see it!

Our Y7 and Y8 learners were treated to a talk by Malcolm Meijin, author of the successful Diary of a Rich Kid series, about the process of writing and creating a novel. The talk was entertaining and informative. Our learners had the chance to ask questions and they responded in an engaged and insightful way, really probing some of the writer's observations.
