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Roots and Shoots for Year 9

Endangered Animals

The Jane Goodall's Roots and Shoot Organisation recently devised a project to help conserve and protect the critically endangered Orangutans, Asian Elephants and the Green Turtles that inhabit across South East Asia. These animals are waning at a shocking rate due to deforestation and waste dumping. Part of the organisation's project was to spread awareness of the crucial importance of protecting critically endangered wildlife by holding an artwork exhibition featuring sculptures, paintings and drawings at Berjaya Times Square, in March 2016. These artworks will be created by students from 12 participating schools in Malaysia.

On Thursday, 1st of October, Year 9 had the opportunity to partake in a sculptural workshop hosted by The Jane Goodall's Roots and Shoots Organisation with the help of Orangutan Appeal UK. This workshop was to show us ways to create sculptures of the targeted animals, made out of waste products and materials.

At the start of the workshop, artist, conservationist and the embassador of Orangutan Appeal UK, Jacha Potgieter, and the Roots and Shoots Project Manager, Jyunichi Washizaki gave a sterling presentation about the importance of these critically endangered animals, the plight that the animals are in and also about deforestation, mainly focusing on the Orangutans. They showed us videos and documentaries about these animals and what is being done to help them.

We were then taught how to create sculptures using waste products such as plastic bottles, cardboard boxes, newspaper and much more. We were shown different ways to bind materials, as well as ways to build the internal framework of the sculpture so that it looked close to the animal. After that, we got into groups and started making our own animal sculptures.

Before the workshop ended, three of us decided to become journalists because we had an opportunity to interview Mr. Jacha Potgieter. We asked him his insights and what he believed would happen. Mr. Potgieter said:

"I became a conservationist because of my love for animals. You have to start somewhere. I am also an optimistic person, so I believe that you students can be successful in saving and conserving our animals." He also said:

"If these animals go extinct, the future generation will never be able to know what these animals looked like, they would not know how an orangutan behaved." Mr. Potgieter also believes that a way to conserve and save these animals is to replant trees, and have sustainable palm oil fields which would lead to a better future.

Throughout the day, it was exciting, it taught the Year 9s the importance of these animals, it gave us a better understanding of these animals and their current plight. We learnt many new skills about sculpturing using waste materials. It was an extremely enjoyable workshop.










CAS Reflection



Starting Nexus Community, I thought to myself, Nishi what are you doing? What are you putting yourself through? You hate kids, why do this? I convinced myself that providing a service towards these unprivileged Myanmar Learners, even though the thought of being able to get along with them was totally bizarre, was a good way to devote my time. This is a new role as I have never been in a position where I must be patient and engage with kids and actually genuinely get to know them. I have never really been a "kids person" as I did not have the patience, and so nexus community will hopefully allow me to become one. Also it is new because I must definitely consider the ethical implications of my actions around them, and provide a good example for them to follow so they can grow to be good individuals because right now they do not have their families to provide that example for them.

The first activity that I was lead was Just Dance, an interactive, minimal effort physical activity to be performed in a classroom. I personally enjoy dance and felt that it would satisfy the young learner's energy frenzies. I had to consider each song I was subscribing to the activity as I needed to gauge on the response of the learners to certain types of music, ie: I knew The Rolling Stones would probably not strike the same chord as Taylor Swift. When the activity started, the learners were enchanted by the graphics and participated enthusiastically alongside flailing team mates (the boys less so than the girls admittedly). However, I

noticed the learners grew tired of the activity halfway through which reminded of the cons of short attention spans. This was coupled with technical issues faced with the equipment. From this, I learned to avoid dependency on technology as although attention-grabbing and instantly stimulating does not offer the same authentic interactions that other activities

An example of this would be an ill-organised day in the field. The session was supposedly dedicated to a game of Softball and Baseball but due to the overbearing language barrier, the instructions of the game was impossible to communicate to reach a level of proficiency in the game. Nonetheless, the session was spent well because we found the learners fully capable of entertaining themselves- they soon resorted to an excited session of flower-picking while the boys had one-on-one tackle sessions with some of my teammates. This session contrasted with the one I organised greatly because it relied on the energy of the present moment alone, it showed me how sometimes, it's the simplest moments that amount to the most meaningful. This session was also significant to me because it was when I fully realised by attachment to one of the learners- Eliyana. We would have little conversations that ran on sign language and share laughter about the frequent silliness of the boys. It was surprising to me because I don't usually get along with kids of that age and that was when I was suddenly aware of my progress of patience.
